General Surrendering Information

- Explore your personal network to see if anyone would be interested in adopting your pet. This can include work, neighbors, friends, social or church groups, your vet's office, or local businesses. Make sure your follow up on any opportunities! This is the least stressful way to place your pet.
- Contact your local Petsmarts and ask about their in-store cat shelter
- Post online advertisements on Craigslist and PetFinder.com, and ads in your local newspapers
- Speak to your veterinarian or groomer about possibilities of boarding or finding placement.
- Connect with the shelter that you originally adopted from, as they may take their animals back.
- Place adoption ads in your local newspapers.
